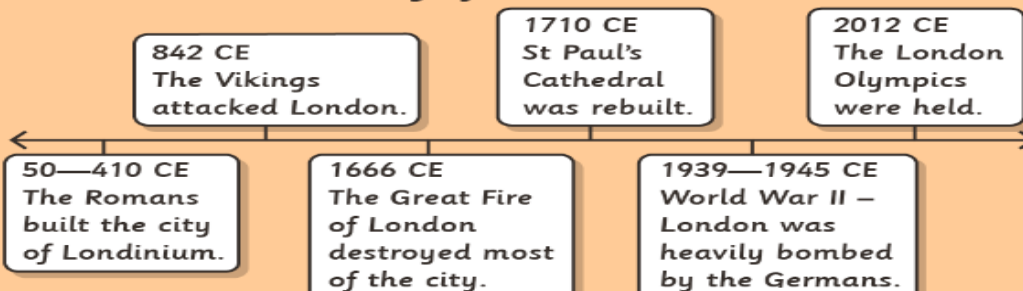

On September 2nd 1666 there was a great fire in London.

We know this information because of a diary kept by a man called Samuel Pepys.

It was hard to extinguish the fire due to the water being hard to transport from the river Thames.

Houses burnt rapidly because they were built from wood and were built closely together.

13,200 houses and 90 churches burnt down.

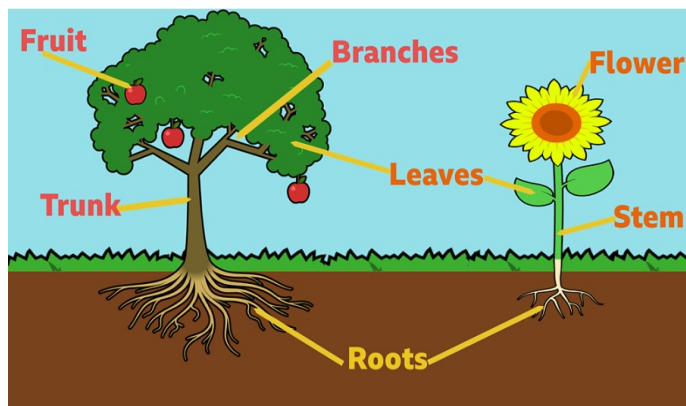
